See Probation Violation Synopsis below:

Case Synopsis:

On September 29, 2015 at about 10:25 a.m. Deputy Stephanie Ryan observed a vehicle stopped at a stop sign with in the community of Dakota Dunes for an unusually long time. The deputy observed that there was no traffic or pedestrians at the intersection that would have required the vehicle to remain stopped at the intersection for an extended period. When the car did pass through the intersection, the vehicle was identified by radar as speeding at a rate of 46 mph in a 40 mph zone. The driver was identified as Shelbie Uhl and the passenger was identified as Hannah Swanson. Both indicated that they were employed by Merry Maids and that they were on their way to clean a house. Shelbie Uhl did not have her license and because she forgot it. During the stop, Uhl admitted that she smoked marijuana approximately one week prior to this stop. Uhl also admitted that there were roaches (the leftover portion of a marijuana joints) were in the vehicle.

Deputy Ryan then visited with Swanson's about drugs, and Swanson stated that there might be marijuana pipes and marijuana in her purse, and advised that Deputy Ryan could search. Deputy Ryan discovered marijuana throughout the vehicle and OxyContin in Swanson's purse. Both Uhl and Swanson denied any knowledge of the OxyContin. A search warrant was applied for and granted for Swanson's urine and Swanson's urine sample was tested positive for marijuana at a level of 103 ng/ml and methamphetamine at a level of 1405 ng/ml.

Sentencing Synopsis:

On the charge of Ingestion of a Controlled Substance, a class five felony, the Court decided to use its judicial clemency to offer Ms. Swanson a suspended imposition of sentence. Swanson was ordered to complete a two-year term of supervised probation. The Court further ordered that Swanson pay all court costs, prosecution costs, fine as a term of satisfying her supervised probation.

Probation Violation Synopsis:

Hannah Swanson has been on probation March 16, 2016 and as of the date of the filing of the probation violation, she has yet to make a court ordered \$50 per month payment. Since March 16, 2016, Swanson has completed five drug patches. Four of the five she failed and the last three were all positive for methamphetamine. Due to her consistent violations of her probation, the file was submitted to the State's Attorney's Office to proceed with a probation violation.

Probation Disposition Synopsis:

On the charge of Ingestion of a Controlled Substance, a class five felony, the Court decided to revoke the previously imposed suspended imposition of sentence. The Court then sentenced Swanson to a suspended five-year sentence to the penitentiary. She was also ordered to complete a four-year term of supervised probation. The Court further ordered that Swanson to serve sixty days in the Union County Jail and gave her credit for the thirteen days she previously spent incarcerated prior to her disposition date. The Court set up a schedule for Swanson to serve the remainder of her sentence. The Court further Ordered that Swanson pay all previously Ordered court costs, prosecution costs, and fine, as well as the additional court-appointed attorney fees for defending her through this process as a term of satisfying her supervised probation.

Criminal History Synopsis:

This is Hannah Swanson's first probation violation on her first felony offense.
